# MEMORIZE THE SONG OF SONGS

(48 SECTIONS: a section/week for a year)



**If you take each section of Scripture & memorize it you will have memorized the book. Remember not to go too quickly. If you have to keep going back over the Scripture again – that means you haven't memorized it to heart.**

**A Scripture is not completely memorized unless you've gone over it 100 times.**

**At first it will be easy but as you "build" on the book you'll find it more challenging.**

**Ask God to give you HIS heart & love for these Scriptures.**

**"Nothing is impossible for God".**

**NOTE: if you like memorize different sections that speak to you!!**

Song of Solomon (Ch.1)

**1:1 Song of Songs**

*Beloved:*

**2 Let him kiss me with the kisses of his mouth**

**- for your love is more delightful than wine.**

**3 Pleasing is the fragrance of your perfumes;**

**your name is like perfume poured out.**

**No wonder the maidens love you!**

*Beloved:*

**1:4 Take me away with you - let us hurry!**

**Let the king bring me into his chambers.**

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**1:4 We rejoice and delight in you;**

**we will praise your love more than wine.**

*Beloved:*

**1:4 How right they are to adore you!**

**1:5 Dark am I, yet lovely,**

**O daughters of Jerusalem,**

**dark like the tents of Kedar,**

**like the tent curtains of Solomon.**

*Beloved:*

**1:6 Do not stare at me because I am dark,  
because I am darkened by the sun.**

**My mother's sons were angry with me  
and made me take care of the vineyards;  
my own vineyard I have neglected.**

**7 Tell me, you whom I love,  
where you graze your flock  
and where you rest your sheep at midday.  
Why should I be like a veiled woman  
beside the flocks of your friends?**

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**1:8 If you do not know, most beautiful of women, follow the  
tracks of the sheep  
and graze your young goats  
by the tents of the shepherds.**

*Lover:*

**1:9 I liken you, my darling,**

**to a mare harnessed**

**to one of the chariots of Pharaoh.**

**10 Your cheeks are beautiful with earrings,  
your neck with strings of jewels.**

*Lover:*

**1:11 We will make you earrings of gold,  
studded with silver.**

*Beloved:*

**1:12 While the king was at his table,  
my perfume spread its fragrance.**

**13 My lover is to me a sachet of myrrh  
resting between my breasts.**

**14 My lover is to me  
a cluster of henna blossoms  
from the vineyards of En Gedi.**

*Lover:*

**1:15 How beautiful you are, my darling!  
Oh, how beautiful!  
Your eyes are doves.**

*Beloved:*

**1:16 How handsome you are, my lover!  
Oh, how charming!  
And our bed is verdant.**

*Lover:*

**1:17 The beams of our house are cedars;  
our rafters are firs.**

(Ch.2)

*Lover:*

**2:1 I am a rose of Sharon,  
a lily of the valleys.**

**2 Like a lily among thorns  
is my darling among the maidens.**

*Beloved:*

**2:3 Like an apple tree  
among the trees of the forest  
is my lover among the young men.  
I delight to sit in his shade,  
and his fruit is sweet to my taste.**

*Beloved:*

**2:4 He has taken me to the banquet hall,  
and his banner over me is love.**

**5 Strengthen me with raisins,  
refresh me with apples,  
for I am faint with love.**

**6 His left arm is under my head,  
and his right arm embraces me.**

**7 Daughters of Jerusalem,  
I charge you by the gazelles  
and by the does of the field:**

**Do not arouse or awaken love until it so desires.**

*Beloved:*

**2:8 Listen! My lover! Look!**

**Here he comes, leaping across the mountains, bounding over the hills.**

**9 My lover is like a gazelle or a young stag.**

**Look! There he stands behind our wall,  
gazing through the windows,  
peering through the lattice.**

**10 My lover spoke and said to me,**

*Lover:*

**2:10 "Arise, my darling, my beautiful one,  
and come with me.**

*Lover:*

**2:11 See! The winter is past;**

**the rains are over and gone.**

**12 Flowers appear on the earth;**

**the season of singing has come,**

**the cooing of doves is heard in our land.**

**13 The fig tree forms its early fruit;**

**the blossoming vines spread their fragrance.**

**Arise, come, my darling;**

**my beautiful one, come with me."**

*Lover:*

**2:14 My dove in the clefts of the rock,**

**in the hiding places on the mountainside,**

**show me your face, let me hear your voice;**

**for your voice is sweet, and your face is lovely.**

**15 Catch for us the foxes,**

**the little foxes that ruin the vineyards,**

**our vineyards that are in bloom.**

*Beloved:*

**2:16 My lover is mine and I am his;**

**he browses among the lilies.**

**17 Until the day breaks**

**and the shadows flee,**

**turn, my lover,**

**and be like a gazelle**

**or like a young stag**

**on the rugged hills.**

(Ch.3)

*Beloved:*

**3:1 All night long on my bed**

**I looked for the one my heart loves;**

**I looked for him but did not find him.**

**2 I will get up now and go about the city,  
through its streets and squares;**

**I will search for the one my heart loves.**

**So I looked for him but did not find him.**

*Beloved:*

**3:3 The watchmen found me**

**as they made their rounds in the city.**

**"Have you seen the one my heart loves?"**

**4 Scarcely had I passed them**

**when I found the one my heart loves.**

**I held him and would not let him go**

**till I had brought him to my mother's house,**

**to the room of the one who conceived me.**

*Beloved:*

**3:5 Daughters of Jerusalem,**

**I charge you by the gazelles**

**and by the does of the field:**

**Do not arouse or awaken love until it so desires.**

**6 Who is this coming up from the desert**

**like a column of smoke,**

**perfumed with myrrh and incense**

**made from all the spices of the merchant?**

*Beloved:*

**3:7 Look! It is Solomon's carriage,**

**escorted by sixty warriors,**

**the noblest of Israel,**

**8 all of them wearing the sword,**

**all experienced in battle,**

**each with his sword at his side,**

**prepared for the terrors of the night.**

*Beloved:*

**3:9 King Solomon made for himself the carriage;**

**he made it of wood from Lebanon.**

**10 Its posts he made of silver, its base of gold.**

**Its seat was upholstered with purple,**

**its interior lovingly inlaid**

**by the daughters of Jerusalem.**

**11 Come out, you daughters of Zion,**

**and look at King Solomon wearing the crown,**

**the crown with which his mother crowned him**

**on the day of his wedding,**

**the day his heart rejoiced.**

(Ch.4)

*Lover:*

**4:1 How beautiful you are, my darling!**

**Oh, how beautiful!**

**Your eyes behind your veil are doves.**

**Your hair is like a flock of goats  
descending from Mount Gilead.**

**2 Your teeth are like**

**a flock of sheep just shorn,  
coming up from the washing.**

**Each has its twin;**

**not one of them is alone.**

*Lover:*

**4:3 Your lips are like a scarlet ribbon;**

**your mouth is lovely.**

**Your temples behind your veil**

**are like the halves of a pomegranate.**

**4 Your neck is like the tower of David,  
built with elegance;**

**on it hang a thousand shields,**

**all of them shields of warriors.**

**5 Your two breasts are like two fawns,  
like twin fawns of a gazelle**

**that browse among the lilies.**

*Lover:*

**4:6 Until the day breaks and the shadows flee,**

**I will go to the mountain of myrrh  
and to the hill of incense.**

**7 All beautiful you are, my darling;  
there is no flaw in you.**

**8 Come with me from Lebanon, my bride,  
come with me from Lebanon.**

**Descend from the crest of Amana,  
from the top of Senir, the summit of Hermon,**

**from the lions' dens**

**and the mountain haunts of the leopards.**



*Lover:*

**4:9 You have stolen my heart,  
my sister, my bride;  
you have stolen my heart  
with one glance of your eyes,  
with one jewel of your necklace.**

**10 How delightful is your love,  
my sister, my bride!  
How much more pleasing  
is your love than wine,  
and the fragrance of your perfume  
than any spice!**

*Lover:*

**4:11 Your lips drop sweetness  
as the honeycomb, my bride;  
milk and honey are under your tongue.  
The fragrance of your garments  
is like that of Lebanon.**

**12 You are a garden locked up,  
my sister, my bride;  
you are a spring enclosed, a sealed fountain.**

**13 Your plants are an orchard of pomegranates  
with choice fruits,  
with henna and nard,**

*Lover:*

**14 nard and saffron,  
calamus and cinnamon,  
with every kind of incense tree,  
with myrrh and aloes  
and all the finest spices.**

**15 You are a garden fountain,  
a well of flowing water  
streaming down from Lebanon.**

*Beloved:*

**4:16 Awake, north wind,  
and come, south wind!  
Blow on my garden,  
that its fragrance may spread abroad.  
Let my lover come into his garden  
and taste its choice fruits.**

(Ch.5)

*Lover:*

**5:1 I have come into my garden,  
my sister, my bride;  
I have gathered my myrrh with my spice.  
I have eaten my honeycomb and my honey;  
I have drunk my wine and my milk.**

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**5:1 Eat, O friends, and drink;  
drink your fill, O lovers.**

*Beloved:*

**5:2 I slept but my heart was awake.**

**Listen! My lover is knocking:**

*Lover:*

**5:2 "Open to me, my sister, my darling,  
my dove, my flawless one.  
My head is drenched with dew,  
my hair with the dampness of the night."**

*Beloved:*

**5:3 I have taken off my robe  
– must I put it on again?  
I have washed my feet  
– must I soil them again?**

**5:4 My lover thrust his hand  
through the latch- opening;  
my heart began to pound for him.**

**5 I arose to open for my lover,  
and my hands dripped with myrrh,  
my fingers with flowing myrrh,  
on the handles of the lock.**

**6 I opened for my lover,  
but my lover had left; he was gone.  
My heart sank at his departure.  
I looked for him but did not find him.  
I called him but he did not answer.**

*Beloved:*

**5:7 The watchmen found me  
as they made their rounds in the city.**

**They beat me, they bruised me;  
they took away my cloak,  
those watchmen of the walls!**

**8 O daughters of Jerusalem,  
I charge you- if you find my lover,  
what will you tell him?  
Tell him I am faint with love.**

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**5:9 How is your beloved better than others,  
most beautiful of women?**

**How is your beloved better than others,  
that you charge us so?**

*Beloved:*

**5:10 My lover is radiant and ruddy,  
outstanding among ten thousand.**

**11 His head is purest gold;  
his hair is wavy and black as a raven.**

**12 His eyes are like doves by the water streams,  
washed in milk, mounted like jewels.**

**13 His cheeks are like beds of spice  
yielding perfume.**

**His lips are like lilies  
dripping with myrrh.**

**5:14 His arms are rods of gold  
set with chrysolite.**

**His body is like polished ivory  
decorated with sapphires.**

**15 His legs are pillars of marble  
set on bases of pure gold.**

**His appearance is like Lebanon,  
choice as its cedars.**

**16 His mouth is sweetness itself;  
he is altogether lovely.**

**This is my lover, this my friend,  
O daughters of Jerusalem.**

(Ch.6)

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**6:1 Where has your lover gone,  
most beautiful of women?**

**Which way did your lover turn,  
that we may look for him with you?**

*Beloved:*

**6:2 My lover has gone down to his garden,  
to the beds of spices,**

**to browse in the gardens  
and to gather lilies.**

**3 I am my lover's and my lover is mine;  
he browses among the lilies.**

*Lover:*

**6:4 You are beautiful, my darling,  
as Tirzah, lovely as Jerusalem,  
majestic as troops with banners.**

**5 Turn your eyes from me;  
they overwhelm me.**

**Your hair is like a flock of goats  
descending from Gilead.**

**6 Your teeth are like a flock of sheep  
coming up from the washing.  
Each has its twin,  
not one of them is alone.**

**6:7 Your temples behind your veil  
are like the halves of a pomegranate.**

**8 Sixty queens there may be,  
and eighty concubines,  
and virgins beyond number;**

**9 but my dove, my perfect one,  
is unique, the only daughter of her mother,  
the favorite of the one who bore her.  
The maidens saw her and called her blessed;  
the queens and concubines praised her.**

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**6:10 Who is this that appears like the dawn,  
fair as the moon,  
bright as the sun,  
majestic as the stars in procession?**

*Lover:*

**6:11 I went down to the grove of nut trees  
to look at the new growth in the valley,  
to see if the vines had budded  
or the pomegranates were in bloom.**

**12 Before I realized it, my desire set me  
among the royal chariots of my people.**

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**6:13 Come back, come back,  
O Shulammite; come back,  
come back, that we may gaze on you!**

*Lover:*

**6:13 Why would you gaze on the Shulammite  
as on the dance of Mahanaim?**

(Ch.7) *Lover:*

**7:1 How beautiful your sandaled feet,  
O prince's daughter!**

**Your graceful legs are like jewels,  
the work of a craftsman's hands.**

**<sup>2</sup> Your navel is a rounded goblet  
that never lacks blended wine.**

**Your waist is a mound of wheat encircled by lilies.**

**<sup>3</sup> Your breasts are like two fawns,  
twins of a gazelle.**

**7:4 Your neck is like an ivory tower.**

**Your eyes are the pools of Heshbon  
by the gate of Bath Rabbim.**

**Your nose is like the tower of Lebanon  
looking toward Damascus.**

**<sup>5</sup> Your head crowns you like Mount Carmel.**

**Your hair is like royal tapestry;  
the king is held captive by its tresses.**

**<sup>6</sup> How beautiful you are and how pleasing,  
O love, with your delights!**

*Lover:*

**7:7 Your stature is like that of the palm,  
and your breasts like clusters of fruit.**

**<sup>8</sup> I said, "I will climb the palm tree;  
I will take hold of its fruit."**

**May your breasts**

**be like the clusters of the vine,**

**the fragrance of your breath like apples,**

**<sup>9</sup> and your mouth like the best wine.**

*Beloved:*

**7:9 May the wine go straight to my lover,  
flowing gently over lips and teeth.**

**<sup>10</sup> I belong to my lover,  
and his desire is for me.**

**<sup>11</sup> Come, my lover,  
let us go to the countryside,  
let us spend the night in the villages.**

*Beloved:*

**7:12 Let us go early to the vineyards  
to see if the vines have budded,  
if their blossoms have opened,  
and if the pomegranates are in bloom  
- there I will give you my love.  
13 The mandrakes send out their fragrance,  
and at our door is every delicacy,  
both new and old,  
that I have stored up for you, my lover.**

(Ch.8)

*Beloved:*

**8:1 If only you were to me like a brother,  
who was nursed at my mother's breasts!  
Then, if I found you outside,  
I would kiss you,  
and no one would despise me.**

*Beloved:*

**8:2 I would lead you  
and bring you to my mother's house  
- she who has taught me.  
I would give you spiced wine to drink,  
the nectar of my pomegranates.  
3 His left arm is under my head  
and his right arm embraces me.  
4 Daughters of Jerusalem, I charge you:  
Do not arouse or awaken love until it so desires.**

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**8:5 Who is this coming up from the desert  
leaning on her lover?**

*Beloved:*

**8:5 Under the apple tree I roused you;  
there your mother conceived you,  
there she who was in labor gave you birth.**

*Beloved:*

**8:6 Place me like a seal over your heart,  
like a seal on your arm;  
for love is as strong as death,  
its jealousy unyielding as the grave  
It burns like blazing fire, like a mighty flame.**

**7 Many waters cannot quench love;  
rivers cannot wash it away.  
If one were to give all the wealth  
of his house for love,  
it would be utterly scorned.**

*Daughters of Jerusalem:*

**8:8 We have a young sister,  
and her breasts are not yet grown.  
What shall we do for our sister  
for the day she is spoken for?**

**9 If she is a wall,  
we will build towers of silver on her.  
If she is a door,  
we will enclose her with panels of cedar.**

*Beloved:*

**8:10 I am a wall, and my breasts are like towers.  
Thus I have become in his eyes  
like one bringing contentment.**

**11 Solomon had a vineyard in Baal Hamon;  
he let out his vineyard to tenants.  
Each was to bring for its fruit  
a thousand shekels of silver.**

**12 But my own vineyard is mine to give;  
the thousand shekels are for you, O Solomon,  
and two hundred are for those who tend its fruit.**

*Lover:*

**8:13 You who dwell in the gardens  
with friends in attendance,  
let me hear your voice!**

*Beloved:*

**8:14 Come away, my lover,  
and be like a gazelle  
or like a young stag  
on the spice-laden mountains.**
